Community Action is audited annually by an independent audit firm. The independent audit covers the agency fiscal year: October 1, 2017 - September 30, 2018. The most recently completed independent audit, for the agency fiscal year ending September 30, 2017, received an unmodified opinion with no findings.

AGENCY EFFORTS TO PREPARE CHILDREN FOR SCHOOL

Using the **Head Start Approach to School Readiness**, Community Action Head Start & Early Head Start have developed the following plan to ensure that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children!

Children ready for school:

As part of ongoing preparation for kindergarten, Community Action Head Start & Early Head Start has developed with staff and parents School Readiness goals which align with Minnesota State Early Childhood Indicators of Progress (ECIP) and Head Start's five essential domains of child development. Teachers and Home Visitors use the online assessment tool, Teaching Strategies Gold Online for ongoing assessment. Data is reviewed for each individual child on a quarterly basis with the child's family. Data is analyzed on several aggregated levels to ensure that progress towards school readiness is achieved. School readiness goals are available upon request.

Families are ready to support their children's learning:

Families are given essential tools to help support the child's learning. This is done via the family partnership which supports the family unit's ongoing support of their child's educational process (such as determining individual goals for their child and reviewing quarterly data regarding their child's outcomes.)

Schools are ready for children:

Community Action works hard to establish and maintain good relations with each school district within Ramsey County. Meetings are held to discuss ongoing initiatives, kindergarten transitions, and other partnership opportunities.
